

WE-SPARK Knowledge Translation Process & Strategies

Knowledge Translation (KT) is a process of exchange between researchers and "knowledge users" designed to make relevant research information available and accessible to stakeholders for use in learning, practice, planning and policymaking. Building on the work of others, WE-SPARK Health Institute considers four interrelated sets of strategies and activities in the KT process that allow for the exchange of research knowledge.
